When do we use CPR?


- ▶ If a person is:
 - ▶ unresponsive (unconscious)
 - ▶ Not breathing normally
- ▶ Normal breathing – approximately 16 to 20 breaths per minute
- ▶ Gaspings or significant gap between breaths requires immediate resuscitation

ANZAC COMMEMORATION PROJECT

Terry asked that the outcome of the deliberations of the Electorate Committee for the Anzac Centenary Local Grants Program be included in the Bulletin.

Here is my report.

The Electorate Committee Anzac Centenary Local Grants Program met at 3pm Friday 11 April at the electoral office of Anna Burke, Federal Member for Chisholm. Sixteen proposals were received and reviewed by the committee. Eight proposals were approved for a total value of \$125000. This was the amount provided to each Federal Member of Parliament to assist local communities in their electorate to undertake their own project that commemorates the service and sacrifice of Australian servicemen and women in the First World War. The proposal submitted by the Rotary Club of Mount Waverley was one of the eight approved by the Electoral Committee. These eight approved proposals will now be forwarded to the DVA in Canberra for their review and final approval. We will be advised in due course of the final decision of the DVA.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE PROJECTS 2012 – 2013-2014

The major thrust of international projects over the past two years has been directed towards improving the primary care, living conditions and educational opportunities for orphaned and disadvantaged children in Cambodia and Mongolia.

Lotus Children's Centre, Mongolia

The major achievement was the successful application for a Matching Grant to provide a 30 seater bus for the Lotus Children's Centre in Mongolia, by far the largest and most complex project undertaken by our Club. Support came as a result of Geoff Taylor speaking to 23 Rotary Clubs and receiving cooperative funding from Oakleigh, Box Hill, Canberra Sunrise and our Club, as well as Matching Grants from District 9810 and The Rotary Foundation totalling \$US28,500.

The bus arrived at a most convenient time as all schools were closed for 5 weeks due to extreme weather below -60 degrees C. The bus enabled the children to go on excursions and

outings before starting its most beneficial ongoing service of taking the older children to and from local high schools.

In this current year both Oakleigh and Mt Waverley Clubs are each sponsoring a Lotus student at the cost of \$1,200 per student. These two projects are proof our Club has the ability to combine resources for a common cause.

The Lotus Project of transporting goods to Mongolia has been achieved in conjunction with RAWCS (Rotary Australian World Community Service). A total of 7 tonnes of winter clothing, educational and sporting goods were sent.

Orphanage - Together for Cambodia, Siem Reap, Cambodia

To date the Rotary Club has an ongoing project of funding the stocking of the library for the Orphanage. The land has been purchased (not by Rotary) for a new building and the plans are being drawn up. Project is being championed by Rhonda & Philip McKenzie. Fund-raising is underway for the buildings. Rhonda is hoping to be able to find funding for the "Compassion" building which also has the library upstairs. This will depend on what can be done for fundraising. Ideally Rhonda would like to be able to at least raise enough money for the library. If Rotary proceeds with the project the Library will be named in honour of Rotary as well as Rhonda/Philip as major donors.

RAWCS

A large quantity of children's books and winter clothing is collected by Geoff Taylor monthly from a number of sources. Members of the Club also assisted in the dismantling of a large number of School desks which together with chairs and bookshelves etc has been delivered to DIK (Donations in kind) for freighting in 2x20' containers through RAWCS to Papua-New Guinea and East Timor.

It is planned to increase our Club's involvement in RAWCS shipments to developing countries. Practical help will be needed as well as financial support.

Humanitarian projects

The Clean Water and Sanitation projects proposed last year were put on hold. The projects have to be assessed as viable, with participation by local Rotary Clubs and cooperation with the receiving countries. At least eight projects have recently passed the evaluation process with preliminary funding approved are now starting to proceed. Local personnel, equipment and storage sheds are in place, and Rotary Clubs wishing to be involved are being asked for their commitment for the 2014-2015 year.

New plumbing techniques for the Water and Sanitation Rotary Action Group (WASRAG) are also becoming available enabling greater efficiency.

The new Rotary Year offers many new humanitarian projects and opportunities for Rotarians – all will require financial support as well as personal involvement. Enjoy the journey.
